## Basic Management of Post-Immunization Anaphylaxis in the Health Centre

## **EARLY RECOGNITION AND TREATMENT IS VITAL!**

Anaphylaxis usually begins a few minutes after injection and is usually evident within 30 minutes. Quicker onset of symptoms may indicate a more serious reaction.

- 1. Inject epinephrine (1:1000) IM in the mid-anterolateral aspect of the thigh:
  - a. Record the time of the dose.
  - b. Repeat q5 to 15 minutes prn, up to a total of 3 doses.
- 2. Direct someone to call 911 (or call yourself).
- 3. **Monitor Frequently:** airway, breathing, circulation, mental status, skin, BP, HR.
- 4. Stabilize:
  - a. Perform CPR if necessary.
  - b. Give adjunctive medication such as diphenhydramine hydrochloride (Benadryl®) if indicated.
- 5. Position:
  - a. On their back or in a position of comfort.
  - b. Elevate the lower extremities.
  - c. Place on their side if vomiting or unconscious.
  - d. Pregnancy: place partly reclined, on their left side with their legs elevated.
- 6. Transfer: to hospital.
